Anniversary Logo of Naga
City encapsulates the core
essence and principles that the
city upholds. Every element
within the logo is a deliberate
reflection of Naga City's
history, values, and significant
attributes.

Central to the logo is the *Narra tree*, a symbolic representation deeply rooted in the city's tradition, honoring both the city's nomenclature and embodying the strength and resilience synonymous with Naga's identity.

The design incorporates *leaves* mirroring the city's map, signifying the 27 barangays of Naga. Their vibrant *green color* signifies life and vitality, portraying the city's health and robustness. Beneath the foliage lies the *trunk*, divided into two segments. One segment signifies the citizens of Naga—hardworking, courageous, and actively engaged. The other

segment symbolizes the city government—emphasizing traits of openness, transparency, effectiveness, and reliability, collectively upholding the city's vision and fostering the renowned good governance of Naga.

Encompassing the tree are the years 1948 and 2023, encapsulating the 75-year span since Naga's establishment as a city on June 18, 1948, through the signing into law of Republic Act No. 305 by President Elpidio Quirino.

The *birds* soaring above the tree epitomize peace and freedom, emblematic of the city's aspiration to provide a joyful life for its residents.

Encircling the logo, the *diamond frame* embodies 75 years of strength, progress, love, and commitment, echoing the enduring significance of the city's journey and growth over time.




Naga City's Panoramic Development:

FROM A GLORIOUS PAST TO A TOWERING FUTURE

OR MORE THAN THREE HUNDRED YEARS, the City of Naga was known throughout the Spanish empire by its mellifluous and colonialist title as *La Ciudad de* Nueva Caceres. Although unknown to most residents, this city takes pride for being one of the first four Spanish royal cities not only in the Philippines but in the entire Southeast Asia, together with Cebu, Manila and Vigan. This becomes the basis for the residents to proudly claim antiquity of their roots and the immensely important role it played both in the national and imperial histories. In celebration of the 75th city charter anniversary, this paper provides a panoramic view of this city's dramatic travail in history, tracing its birth from an indigenous riverine settlement to its rise as a bustling Spanish city, which served as solid cultural foundations for its exponential transformation as one of the highly urbanized and progressive metropolitan centers in the Philippines in the present.

> FROM THE INDIO VILLAGE OF NAGA TO THE SPANISH CITY OF NUEVA CACERES


Located almost at the center of the densely populated riverine district known to the native population as Bicol, the village of Naga, was described by various early Spanish records as the most affluent and powerful settlement. Surviving oral traditions and earliest available colonial written accounts traced the origin of its peculiar name to a duck, or a mythical serpent, but the most popular attributed it to the narra tree. Such pristine and idyllic world of ancient Naga came to a suddenly end with the arrival of the first band of Spanish conquistadores.

In the early part of 1576, an impressive Spanish force led by the intrepid captain, Pedro de Chavez, accompanied by a horde of native allies, entered the Bicol riverine district and found the opulent village of Naga. Despite a spirited resistance made by the natives, the settlements were swiftly subdued by the superior Iberian force. Spanish control of the territory was consolidated on May 27, 1579 when Capt. Juan Arce de Sardonil promptly founded on the other side of the bank of the Bikol river opposite the ancient village of Naga, a Spanish settlement where all encomenderos of that province congregated and made their

residence. On the 16th of September 1579, by the decree of Governor-General Francisco de Sande, this Spanish settlement assumed the name Nueva Caceres, in honor of the birthplace of the incumbent Governor-general, the city of Caceres in Spain. The Governor-General likewise appointed what became the city's first set of officials composed of six regidores, an escribano publico, and a secretary of the cabildo. To formalize the creation of the city, the Spanish residents of this city petitioned the king for a royal confirmation. Although nothing was known of the king's response, it could be assumed that a royal franchise was conferred on this nascent Iberian community as the settlement flourished in

While the Iberian community in Nueva Caceres extended their war of conquest to the nearby villages, the task of consolidating Spanish hegemony was carried out by the missionary enterprise of the few Franciscan missionaries based in the convent of San Francisco de Naga beginning in 1578. It was also these pioneering missionaries who laid the foundation for the city's typical urban landscape.

One of the earliest social features of the emerging colonial city was its multi-cultural population. Aside from the

original indigenous residents and the small Iberian community, the cultural landscape of the colonial city was enriched by a small number of migrants called Sangley, the Chinese, whose presence could be traced back centuries prior to the coming of Spain. The Chinese' earliest documented presence in the city was recorded in Bishop Antonio de San Gregorio's report in 1650 which mentioned some 10 or 12 houses of Chinese merchants in the city.

clashes which marred their relationship with the Spanish authorities in the 17th century, Chinese population continued to thrive in the city. By the 1730's their number assumed a small community

called the Sangley Parian which 18th century parish records referred to as pariancillo, located along the present Padian street. It might therefore be possible that the name of the street, Padian, was a corruption of parian rather than a term associated with the seminary which also rose in the same place probably in the latter part of the 18th century.

This abaca industry and the handicraft industry, which utilized indigenous materials, became the main source of livelihood of the natives which produced, aside from cordage, also items for personal and household decorations such as bags, rugs of various colors, and native handicrafts

made of indigenous palms. Among the products were nito hats, chestboxes, wallets and other items which these natives sell in Naga. At any rate, most of these items confined their market in the city. According to the report of Bishop Domingo Collantes in 1792, the city had regular market days every Wednesday and Saturday.

The traditional market systems such as the saod and the tiangge survived in the second half of the 19th century. The nocturnal market trading particularly during Wednesdays and Saturdays continued to draw large crowd. Adolfo Puya Ruiz, a Spanish journalist who visited the city in 1887, observed that the people who flocked

to the market were there either to buy their basic necessities or to court the young vendors. Puya Ruiz was amused by the sight of these young vendors in the city market who, "seated on the floor and by the light of the juepe are selling, tobacco, buyo, native liquor, sinamais, etc."

Alongside the proliferation of these portable stalls, was the emergence of variety stores or almacenes. At about 1880's among the more popular big stores in the city was the Spanish store popularly referred to as Sres. Munoz Hermanos y Sobrinos. This was famous throughout the province for its wide array of luxury and imported goods sold at prices at par with those in Manila. But by 1890's bigger stores sprouted in what would become the business district of this Spanish city. This business section extended from Tabuco to Via Gainza where numerous stores were lined up. The most important street in this commercial district was the Calle Real (now the General Luna Street) where the more prominent stores were located such as the wine cellar of Senores Castillo y Lomas. Antonio Pelayo's store also sold local and imported liquors. So was the Spaniard Jose Esturi.

As sophisticated lifestyle took roots among the residents of the city and the neighboring municipalities, businessmen were quick to perk up local demands for classy lifestyle

Despite the occasional violent



items. Wide array of luxury items such as perfumes and jewelries were displayed for sale in the stores of Sres Antonio Gaudo and Ca. (Compaña), and from the bazar of Mariano Abella which aside from the abovementioned item also sold porcelain wares. Drugstores also became a major business enterprise and one of the earliest and most well-known was owned by Tomas Prieto, a young but brilliant pharmacist about the early years of 1890's. By 1896 other drugstores were opened. The vibrant economic life of the city also attracted professional physicians. Among its earliest Bikolano medical doctors was Severo Patrocinio who registered his medical practice in the city about 1893. Another physician in the city was Felix Munoz de Bustillo, apparently a Spaniard or of Spanish descent. Aside from physicians the city also drew some other minor medical practitioneers such as dentists, vaccinators and even sanitary inspectors. Among the more popular dentists was Francisco Eguia, originally from Manila but took advantage of the booming industry and settled in the city.

One of the hallmarks of development of the second half of the nineteenth century was the continuing expansion of road networks extending beyond the immediate boundaries of the city. In 1887 inland travel to nearby towns of Milaor, Camaligan, Canaman, Magarao, Calabanga and Pili was possible through these roads. Alfred Marche, a French traveller to the region in 1887, noted that the roads which linked the city to other towns were solid and fairly well-maintained.

The booming industry also boosted the intellectual life of the city. At about 1893 the city already boasted of a bookstore and a printing press called Imprenta de la Sagrada Familia owned by Mariano Perfecto located in what was then a bustling commercial area called Via Gainza (now Peñafrancia Avenue in a site where the Phil-Am Life now stands). Almost at the same time the first newspaper in Kabikolan the El Eco del Sur began circulating every Sunday first came out in the 25th of June 1893 but eventually folded up about 1894.

> THE FIFTEEN MARTYRS AND THE CRADLE OF BIKOLANO NATIONALISM

During the closing years of the Spanish regime in the Philippines, the city of Caceres became the showcase of nationalist activism. What constituted as the core of nationalist propaganda in the region was the local intellegentsia who obtained their preliminary education from the famed Seminario-conciliar de Nueva Caceres. When the ideas of the reform movement reached the city, a more enthusiastic support came from the elite. This collective but inchoate patriotic sentiment was further consolidated with the birth of the masonic movement in the city. Logia Bicol no. 64, as the first masonic lodge in Bikol was named, owed its birth from a peninsular Spaniard residing in the city in the 1890's named Don Juan Utor y Fernandez. Utor was fondly referred to by his masonic brethren as El Padre Nuestro

on account of his being the Father of Masonry in the region. Owing to his influence, Utor succeeded in penetrating various sectors of the society and carry out his masonic proselytization. The masonic movement initiated by Utor prospered and drew membership from various sectors of the society not only from among the wealthy and educated indio-mestizos but even from among the Spaniards themselves.

On 22 August 1896, three days after the katipunan was discovered in Manila, Gov. Gen. Ramon Blanco telegrammed all provincial governors informing them that an "entire secret organization with a masonic character was discovered" and ordered all civil governors to be more vigilant of all persons suspected of embracing ideas against religion and the state. In response, the civil governor of Ambos Camarines, Don Ricardo Lacosta, issued an arrest order of numerous prominent persons in the province, many of them were based in Nueva Caceres. By the last week of December of 1896, the group of Tomas Prieto and those he implicated in his testimony were convicted with the crime of rebellion and received varying sentences. Eleven, however, were sentenced to die by musketry. They were: Manuel Abella, millionaire and notary public; Domingo Abella, surveyor and son of Manuel Abella; Tomas Prieto, acting mayor of Nueva Caceres and a brilliant pharmacist; Fr. Gabriel Prieto, brother of Tomas and parish priest of Malinao; Fr. Severino Diaz, parish priest of the Cathedral; Fr. Inocencio Herrera, choirmaster; Mariano Melgarejo, former mayor of Nueva Caceres and draughtsman of the public works; Camilo Jacob, photographer; Florencio Lerma, teacher of music and owner of carriage shop; Cornelio Mercado, clerk of the Department of Finance (hacienda publica). The execution was carried out on 4 January 1897 at the Bagumbayan Field, now Luneta. These men, including Leon Hernandez, Ramon Abella and

Mariano Arana came to be called as the Quince Martires of Bikol.

But on the midnight of the 18th of September 1898, feast of the Virgin of Peñafrancia, the city was awakened from its slumber with angry shouts and outbursts of gunfire. The unexpected revolution had erupted in Nueva Caceres. Although the Spaniards were right in their belief that the Tagalog revolution would not gain substantial followings in the region, they were, however, wrong in thinking that a similar outburst of violence against them would not occur in the city. It was too late for the Spanish authorities to realize that the revolt would not be orchestrated by the masons nor by the katipunaneros but by their own trusted indio civil guards. The revolt was planned and carried out under the leadership of Corporals Elias Angeles and Felix Plazo.

The successful bloody revolt in Nueva Caceres which brought the proud Spanish government to its tragic end in the province likewise signaled the end of Spanish rule in the whole region and a provisional government independent of the Aguinaldo government was organized. But the atmosphere of freedom was short lived as the strain on the relationship between the Americans and the Filipino troops worsened and finally ruptured into a seething warfare, the Filipino-American War. When the Americans entered Nueva Caceres on the 22nd of February 1900, it was virtually a deserted place and Nueva Caceres fell on the Americans without any fight. Few days later, the inhabitants of the various municipalities particularly Nueva Caceres began to return to their respective residences. marking the beginning of American colonial control of the city and the province in general.

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> AMERICAN DEMOCRACY AND CAPITALIST **PROSPERITY**

One of the greatest and most novel aspects introduced by the American colonial government to the city was free popular education. The arrival of the U.S.S. Thomas which transported substantial number of teachers, the Thomasites, paved the way for the opening on 15 July 1903 of a grammar and a high school under the supervision of Frank L. Crone. But Catholic schools continued to enjoy esteemed reputation and the Colegio de Sta Isabel remained the only Catholic school for women. One of the most popular among these Catholic schools was the Camarines Sur Catholic Academy founded in June of 1928 by Fr. Luis Dimarumba and Bishop Francisco Reyes which was replaced by the Ateneo de Naga in 1940. Private schools such as the Southern Luzon College also opened.

New entertainment facilities were also opened such the cinema. The first non-talking movie was introduced in Naga in the 1920's which came to be called Cine Union which quickly encountered difficulties and folded up shortly. Another movie house was opened in the same spot called Cine Cita by the Almeda family but also suffered the same fate as the previous one. The movie house business in the city had begun to take a big turn when the Lebanese couple, Victor Bichara and Emily Panayotti opened movie houses in the 1920s.


Although horse drawn vehicles such as the calesas still dominated the streets of Naga in the early decades of the American regime, automobiles, began invading the streets and became an index of high socio-economic status in 1930's. Among the first and more popular owners of these cars were the families of Dy-Lliaco, Lopez, Arroyo, Abella, Diaz, and the Meliton. A more efficient public transport system came with the ALATCO buses.



With the presence of cars came gasoline stations and repair shops. One of the earliest gasoline stations set up in the 30's was owned by a Chinese named Yu Kiw located near the Tabuco Bridge. This gasoline station also offered other array of car parts and accessories. The Naga Auto Repair Shop owned by C. Aragon was among the more popular repair shops in Naga.

The increasing volume of trade likewise affected the influx of non-residents of the municipality of Naga and thus the need for lodging. By the 1930's Naga provided visitors with convenient accommodation during their stay in this bustling municipality when Jacinto Ursua opened in February 1933 the Libmanan Hotel in the Balintawak street. Subsequently more hotels were opened such as the Bicol Hotel Grocery with a restaurant and a bakery. The most sophisticated hotel was the Ritz, located in the area where the Crown Hotel now stands. The growth in the number of students in Naga from towns far and near opened opportunity for dormitory business such as that of Macandog and what came to be known as the Provincial Girls Dormitories.

Growing side by side with the rise in hotel and dormitory business was the food industry. Restaurants and food processing proliferated since the early decades of the American period. The famous *Cu Tu Co*, a Chinese store selling chocolates, sweets, native soap and other grocery items. The Sanitary Bakery and Grocery was well-known for its wide array of food products such as ham, bread, biscuits, grocery items, fresh fruits, etc. Naga Rendezvous owned by the Chinese Yen Nuat offered Chinese and American cuisine, Bicol Cafe, owned by the Anciano's was among the biggest restaurants in Naga shortly before the second world war.

> FROM WARTIME TO POST-WAR REBIRTH OF THE CITY

The outbreak of the Pacific War and the subsequent arrival of the Japanese in Naga, abruptly threw the town in chaos and a lingering four years of darkness. Indeed, life under occupied Naga was difficult since the war virtually destroyed the major means of production serving as the life blood not only of the capital but of the province as a whole. Although a semblance of normalcy was subsequently restored few months after, occasional outbreak of hostilities continued to sow fear and uncertainty. Between January and April of 1942, Naga was relatively quiet but not in nearby municipalities where restive civilians and members of the disbanded regular and reserve units began organizing underground resistance movements. In an impresssive display of unity and bravery, a composite guerilla force headed by Faustino Flor assisted by Juan Q. Miranda and Teofilo Padua made a coordinated attack on Naga on 1 May 1942. This victory however, was short-lived for few days later, an impressive contingent of the Japanese cavalry supported by tanks and planes arrived in Naga.

The ordeal of the residents of Naga continued for the next three years. By 1944, reports indicating that the tide of war was changing favorably for the allies infused tremendous hopes for the despairing residents. About the first months of 1945, residents heard of more aggressive guerilla combat

operations on Japanese patrols and even on their fortified garrisons in the neigh boring towns. The anticipated liberation of Naga finally arrived when an impressive composite querilla forces led by Maj. Juan Q. Miranda entered the capital and engaged the Japanese in a historic three-day battle, from April 9 until 12, forcing the Japanese to finally withdrew and sought refuge in the mountains of Isarog. When the Americans arrived, Naga was already cleared of enemies.

Like the mythical phoenix rising from the ashes, Naga was among the few provincial capitals in the Philippines where recovery from the devastating effects of the Pacific War was remarkably quick. By the first months of 1946, Naga was steadily restoring its pre-war urban vibrance. Naga's post-war rehabilitation was greatly facilitated by, among others, the immediate restoration of electric power. Except for a brief period of interruption, particularly at the height of the battle for liberation, the distribution of power supply in Naga by Meralco was generally efficient. By the first months of 1946, this electric company had resumed normal operations. Likewise, water supply from the NAWASA, except for its routine but voluntary nocturnal shutdowns, was regular.

Commerce and trade also resumed with remarkable haste. At the start of 1946, Naga registered at least eight classy refreshment parlors and restaurants, some were already operating prior to the outbreak of the war. The more popular were the *New China Restaurant*, the *Sugar Bowl Refreshments*, the *New State Cafe and Restaurant*, the *Washington Restaurant*, the *El Gaucho Restaurant*, the *Allied Restaurant*, the *New Kitchen*, and *The Lucky Hotel and Restaurant*. Hardware and lumber business also prospered as residents were engaged in the repair of damaged buildings, an auspicious condition which enterprising Chinese and mestizos seized to gamble on their capital. Famous among them were the *Central Supply*, the *Southern Luzon Lumber and Hardware Corporation*, the *Cledera Lumber*, the *Leechan Hardware* and the pre-war *Mariano Dy-Liacco and Sons, Inc.*

Transportation and communication facilities began operating by 1946. On 2 November of that year, the *Far Eastern Transport Inc. (FEATI)* made an inaugural flight of passenger plane PI-C39 christened "City of Naga." Inland travel to and from Naga was already regular and inter-provincial transportation needs were served by the famous *ALATCO* buses described as "safe, regular, courteous and economical."

The clamor for the resumption of educational services in the post-war Naga received a response from a young teacher named Melchor Villanueva who opened a private school named Naga College in the summer of 1947. A year after, Naga witnessed the birth of another school, the Nueva Caceres Colleges, founded by the Commonwealth and war-time Finance Secretary Jaime Hernandez. Other private schools both collegiate and technical/ vocational were opened such as the **Bicol** Institute, the Southern Luzon College, the Garcia Business Institute, the Elegant Fashion Academy, the Camarines Sur Fashion Academy, and the Vicki's Academy. More schools were added to the list of academic institutions in Naga even barely a year after. The Naga Parochial **School** was opened to provide a Catholic education to the young pupils. At the beginning of the school year 1947-48, the two Catholic schools, the Ateneo de Naga and Colegio de Santa Isabel, did not only resume operation but both opened courses in the college level.

To brighten the gloomy spirits of the post-war residents, two pre-war movie houses, Alex and *Bichara Theaters*, resumed operations in the early months of 1946, almost simultaneously with another movie house, the *Cine Cita* of the Almeda family. This process of rehabilitation, nevertheless, culminated in the legislative creation of the municipality of Naga into a city in 1948. Preliminary steps for the creation of Naga into a city was initiated in the early months of 1948 by the local

municipal council headed by Mayor Faustino Reyes. The guerilla-turned-politician, Cong. Juan Q. Miranda, apparently played a pivotal role in the planning and in the subsequent realization of this historic charter. In his effort to provide wider dissemination and a more enlightened public appreciation of the proposal, an influential lawyer of Naga, Patricio Amanse, wrote an article in the Bicol Star arguing heavily on the fiscal benefits of the proposed charter. He pointed out that if Naga were to become a city, "its revenue would be increased by more than twice without increasing the present rate of taxes being paid by its citizens, especially the merchants and the businessmen."

On 18 June 1948, in the presence of prominent Bikolano national officials such as Sen. Vicente Madrigal, Sec. Mariano Garchitorena, Rep. Juan Q. Miranda, Rep. Toribio Perez, Rep. Tomas Clemente, and the lawyer Antonio Ojeda, the House Bill No. 1255, sponsored by Rep. Juan Q. Miranda, was signed by Pres. Elpidio Quirino into a law. This historic law came to be known as R.A. No. 305 which formally declared Naga a charter city. One of the major provisions of this charter dealt with the creation of the city council composed of eight key officials, namely: the mayor, the treasurer, the engineer, and the five councilors. The latter were to be elected by the voting population of the city every three years. The city council was to meet every week but could be convened for special sessions provided these would not exceed 30 times per year.

After 444 years since the creation of la ciudad de Nueva Caceres on September 16, 1579 as one of the first four Spanish cities, and 75th years after it became a charter city on June 18, 1948, Naga has accomplished remarkable milestones in terms of urban development and commercial prosperity. Such achievement is conspicuously reflected on the towering infra-structural transformation punctuating not only the vibrant tropical skylines of the heartland of the city but also the once remote and inaccessible forested slopes of the majestic Mount Isarog. It can be said therefore that, as Naga residents under Mayor Nelson Legacion takes a nostalgic glance back into its idyllic days of old, one can whisper that indeed, it has truly gone a long way!

> THE HEART OF THE CITY

The City of Naga is the Heart of Bicol. When in Naga you will hear locals say *centro* myriad times. From commuters hailing a ride, or people asking, "where are you going?" Center. is the answer. It is a Spanish word, and, to say it in English, it would be, "center." In translation it is the City Center. Naga's Downtown— the most happening place -is the heart of the city.

In this beatnik age and modernism, the buildings at the City Center are mostly repurposed. The glory days of movie theaters had seen their golden heydays. For instance, the Emily Theatre is now an arcade. The Advent Theatre became a department store, although again it is under renovation. Poon and Jason Theatre is now the Unitop department store. Probably the only one still showing films would be the Bichara Theatre but it is now called the Bichara Mall. One of the buildings that is still what it used to be and had just undergone renovations is the Philippine National Bank structure.

> A PLETHORA OF PARKS

Plaza Quezon is named after President Manuel L. Quezon who saved 1,200 Jews from Nazi Germany. The plaza is where parades, concerts, morning exercises. shows, and, campaigns are conducted.

Plaza Rizal was built to honor the National Hero, Dr. Jose Rizal. He was a writer and an ophthalmologist. The plaza is a place for relaxation, and leisure, and street foods, and coffee, and, other refreshments. Is is a must-see in the Christmas Season when it is abundantly decorated with ornaments.

Plaza Quince Martires was built to honor the 15 martyrs who died for the country. They are Camilo Jacob, Severino Diaz, Florencio Lerma, Domingo Abella, Mariano Arana, Mariano Melgarejo, Macario Valentin, Mariano Ordenanza, Cornelio Mercado, Tomas Prieto, Ramon Abella, Gabriel Prieto, Manuel Abella, Leon Hernandez, and, Inocencio Herrera. They were accused by Spaniards as conspirators during the Philippine Revolution in 1896 - 1898.

Plaza de Nueva Caceres is where the Oragon monument can be found. It commemorated the 62nd establishment anniversary of the city in 2010. With honoring the city's former name it is a fitting tribute to history and its lessons.

Vincentian Heritage Park is a religious park with the statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary on a high pedestal. A lush garden with a few saints also grace the park like Saint Vincent de Paul, Saint Elizabeth Seton, and, Saint Catherine.

Plaza Jorge Barlin is named after the first Bicolano and Filipino bishop in the Roman Catholic Church.

In this area, a lot of ancestral houses can be appreciated if you are a history buff. It is also teeming with restaurants. You may compare it to a smaller-scale-version of Champs-Élysées.

Senator Raul Roco's ancestral house is located along the street. It had been their family house since time immemorial. And it is made of wood unlike the typical bahay na bato. You would see much of the second floor.

At the end of Barlin Street is the Porta Mariae. The religious monument was built to commemorate the 300 years of devotion to Ina. The arch is 36-foot tall. It is a mini-me version of Arc de **Triomphe** in Paris. On top of the arch is a 10-foot image of **Ina** made of brass.



> CULTURAL HERITAGE CHURCHES AND MUSEUMS

Naga is well known as the "Queen City of Bicol" because of the historical significance of the city in Bicolandia. Most of the Spanish Churches have been restored and preserved. These churches are a source of pride among the locals due to their amazing distinct architecture and inherent magnificence.

Naga Metropolitan Cathedral is of Spanish Romanesque Revival style. Construction of the present Cathedral started in 1808. This is a favorite among tourists. The interior of the church is beautifully painted with intricate designs.

Our Lady of Peñafrancia Shrine was constructed in 1742 and completed in 1750. The old home of Our Lady prior to its transfer at Basilica. Spearheaded by Bishop Ysidore Arevalo, it has a lovely ceiling painted with events in Jesus' life.

Minor Basilica of the Our Lady of Peñafrancia is the new home of Our Lady of Peñafrancia since 1985. Monumental space to accommodate the growing number of devotees was its main objective.

The San Francisco Church was constructed in 1578. The architecture of the church is European and the clean lines are noticeable. One tower is pyramidal in shape, and it evokes a contemporay vibe while keeping an old-world-charm.

The city has its own Indian Sikh Temple that can only be viewed from the outside. However, the temple's towers can be seen. While a Temple of Taoism is thriving in the midst of other churches of different Christian denominations.










The Peñafrancia Museum displays the crowns, the Aureolas, and the *Mantos* of *Ina*. Written devotions are curated and may be perused by museum-goers.

The UNC Museum is being rebuilt by the Ayala/Yuchengco group. The schedule of its reopening is in July of this year, 2023. It will house significant artifacts.

The V Gallery x Museum proclaims itself as an Art Gallery Museum that showcase Artworks made by Local Artists and the History of Naga College Foundation. Free admission as of this writing.

The Museo del Seminario Conciliar de Nueva Caceres is located inside the Holy Rosary Minor Seminary. Minimal fee is charged upon entry. It has old paintings and Catholic church pieces.

The Jesse Robredo Museum is dedicated to the former mayor of the city. He was also the Secretary of the Interior and Local Government from 2010 until his death in 2012 due to a plane crash.

> PILGRIM CITY

A bastion of the Roman Catholic Church, the city is a crowd drawer during its Seasons, particularly, Lent and Christmas. Moreover, all roads lead to Naga for the Peñafrancia Fiesta in September and the Peñafrancia de Mayo. The Marian pilgrimage is considered to be one of the largest in Asia.

These churches are the Basilica of Our Lady of Peñafrancia, Carmelite monastery, Holy Cross Parish, Mary Of Co-redemptrix Church, Mater Salutis Parish, Naga Metropolitan Cathedral, Our Lady of Fatima Parish, Our Lady of Immaculate Conception Parish, Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, Our Lady of Peñafrancia Shrine, Saint Jude Thadeus Parish, San Francisco Church. San Lorenzo de Manila Parish.

Beginning on the second Friday of September each year, the 10-day *fiesta* is heralded by a procession called *Traslacion* when the centuries-old image of the Blessed Virgin Mary is transported from the Peñafrancia Basilica to the Naga Metropolitan Cathedral.

While the nine-day-novena-prayers are being conducted at the cathedral, simultaneous celebrations with civil and military parades, region-wide pageants, concerts, trade shows and, other fun-filled activities are happening all over the city.

On the third Saturday of September, the image of *Ina* is returned, aboard her andas and pulled by the voyadores, to the basilica via the iconic Naga River. Then, Sunday marks the feast day of Our Lady of Peñafrancia. Pontifical High Masses are celebrated in the basilica, attended by hundreds of thousands of faithful devotees and pilgrims.

IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO EXPERIENCE the same event but in a smaller-scale you may opt to attend the Peñafrancia de Mayo where women are the ones who board the *pagoda*. All the traditions are still observed but with a much lesser number of people. This is ideal for older people, women, and, children. THE SYMBIOTIC NATURE OF NAGA'S EXECUTIVE OFFICE AND LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

THE ENTIRE LOT AREA FOR THE LEGACY RESIDENCES PROJECT is about 12,068 SQUARE METERS which will be divided into seven buildings. Each building will be 12 STORIES high and will house 550 UNITS, with a total of 6,000 UNITS across all seven buildings. Aside from the initial building site here in the Balatas Development Center, The Legacy Residences will also be established in other barangays in Naga, namely in Barangays Sta. Cruz, San Felipe, Lerma, and Carolina.







> SEPARATE BUT EQUAL

Under the Constitution, the Executive and Legislative are two of the three equal branches of government; with the third being the Judicature. The Executive branch, with the Mayor as chief executive and administrative officer, is in charge of implementing the policies set by the council, and seeing to it that local laws are carried out. On the other hand, the Legislative branch, presided by the Vice Mayor and composed of the elected councilors, is mandated to formulate and approve ordinances and resolutions, and to generate and maximize the use of resources and revenues for the development plans, program objectives, and priorities of the city. The two function very differently: one enacts and the other enforces.







THE NAGA CITY GENERAL HOSPITAL, a collaborative effort between the city council and the executive branch led by Mayor Legacion, stands proud in the Balatas Development Center. Anticipated to commence operations in November 2023, this healthcare facility symbolizes dedication to community well-being.

The Executive and Legislative both have powers to be each other's internal control. Checks and balances are meant to prevent the centralization of power, reduce mistakes, and correct improper behavior. It also clearly defines the duties and responsibilities of the equal branches, share decisions and accountability between them, and even force each other's cooperation for the completion of important projects. But when the Executive and Legislative work as a team, cooperation is not forced, but rather willingly given.







Clearly, the Executive and Legislative are two different and distinct offices; but in Naga City, now more than ever, the two have been in a harmonious relationship and have worked collaboratively in the service of Nagueños. This symbiotic nature of Naga City's Executive and Legislative branches has ensured that policies and projects are crafted and designed with the people in mind, and their

> CONTINUOUS SUPPORT

Even after the launch of The Legacy Residences project, the 14th Sangguniang Panlungsod continues to show support to the Mayor's vision by passing more resolutions to help the project come to fruition. Resolution No. 2023-245 authorizes the Mayor to negotiate and enter into a contract of sale for the acquisition of 2,123 square meter property and Resolution No. 2023-246 for 1,210 square meter lot, both located at Barangay Balatas, which will be used as part of the Project Development Plan of the Legacy Residences.

This cooperation between the Office of the Mayor and the Sangguniang Panlungsod is not unique to the Legacy Residences project. These two offices have always been in-sync when it comes to projects that will elevate and uplift the lives of Nagueños. Resolution Nos. 2022-687 and 2022-688 green lighted the construction of satellite markets in Barangay Carolina and Barangay Sta. Cruz respectively allowing residents of the area to have easy and convenient access to food and other necessities. Resolutions Nos. 2022-685 and 2022-686 approved the construction of multi-purpose evacuation centers for Barangay Concepcion Pequeña and Barangay Carolina respectively making government response in times of calamities and emergencies quick and adequate.

Flooding during rainy seasons can be mitigated with projects like the construction of box culverts which the Sanggunian supports with Resolution Nos. 2022-682 for Barangay Pacol and 2022-683 for Barangay Concepcion Pequeña. Traffic can be abated and alleviated with the help of Resolution Nos. 2022-660 permitting the widening of the Balatas-Cararayan Road and 2022-661 doing the same for Queborac Drive in Barangay Bagumbayan Sur. Resolution Nos. 2022-678, 2022-679, 2022-680, and 2022-681 allows for the installation of Cat's Eye road stud devices in various roads and highways in Naga City enhancing road safety for Nagueños and other motorists passing through the city.

In the sum of all things, Nagueños are the real winners here.



Nagueños. Being one who also came from among the less privileged yet managed to make it successfully in his profession as both a lawyer and now a public servant, Mayor Legacion largely understands the importance of being presented with the necessary opportunities for empowerment and development, in order to achieve despite the limiting circumstances.

It is in this same perspective that he set to steer the direction of Naga when he first assumed post as City Mayor in 2019. He then came to find a city that is not in good shape as it was before. Naga was being confronted with varied concerns from all sides— presence of out-of-school children and youths, traffic and road issues, flooding, lack of job opportunities, and to top it all, a downswing in the Cities and Municipalities Competitiveness Index (CMCI) rankings.

For Legacion, this should not be the case for a city that is being recognized as a premier one in the region. In his first days in office, he set it early on as an indispensable LGU priority, that economic development by means of attracting domestic and foreign investors in order to develop the local economy and generate

jobs without losing sight on social services, is the way forward for the Naga. These, together with tourism promotion and providing the necessary infrastructure shall be the major focus of his administration's agenda.

Guided by this direction, the Legacion administration embarked on the opening of new schools and the establishment of new government and business centers in the city. These aim to make education and health services more accessible for the Nagueños, as well as provide more business, job, and employment opportunities, so as to capacitate the citizenry in realizing their fullest potential and aspirations, and become productive members of the society contributing to the development of the community. These, together with other infrastructure developments, have since then been helping introduce positive changes and improvements in both the city's landscape and the lifescape of the Nagueños.

> EDUCATION AS KEY FOR **TRANSFORMATION**

Legacion holds the sector of education close to his heart. The many turning points in his own life story have their hinges rested upon his attainments in schooling. This passion for education had been evident early on in his many crafted legislations benefitting the education sector during his stint as a City Councilor.

When he begun with the conduct of community meetings in the different barangays and sitios of Naga in his incumbency as City Mayor, the growing concern on the presence of many out-ofschool children and youths particularly in the far-off villages that he came to know in many of his visits, weighed him a heavy burden. Accordingly, the problem stems primarily from lack of financial means of the families to afford of transportation and other costs of sending them to school.

For Legacion, true to his very own life experience, education is the key that allows one to access many other opportunities and possibilities for further development in many aspects, and thus being deprived of the privilege will be disadvantageous for both the individual and the entire community especially in the long run.

With this in sight, he led the city government in establishing new schools in those needing communities. In a span of four (4) years, the city government had already established five (5) new barangay-based schools— one elementary school in Sitio Yabu, Barangay Carolina, and four (4) new national high schools in the barangays of San Isidro, Balatas, Sta. Cruz, and the recent one in Mabolo.

The schools are currently accommodating a total of more than 1, 500 enrollees and are helping reduce the cases of outof-school children and youth in Naga, with families in said areas now being presented with an option for schooling that would entail them lesser to no transportation costs at all.

In addition, with the new schools now offering a more accessible education services for students in the vicinity, the facilities assisted in the decongestion of several big schools in the city that have been struggling with problems on student overpopulation, and thus even helped in fostering quality education with the decreased teacher-to-student ratio.

Further helping improve the quality of education being given to students, the Legacion administration embarked also on the construction of additional school buildings for the existing schools in the city. At present, the local government was able to construct and turn-over more than 170 classrooms that are

now helping provide conducive spaces for learning and assist in the provision of quality education.

Aside from these benefits to accessibility and quality of learning, the new schools also opened employment opportunities to teaching and even non-teaching staff, to provide the necessary education services. To date, more than 60 new teachers were now being provided with the job opportunity.

More than these, the administration is seeing even more rewarding opportunities that would soon follow with the establishment of new school sites. These would include the opening of local businesses, improved means of transportation services, and other economic activities that will further help revitalize the local economy in those communities.

> MIXED-USE URBAN DEVELOPMENT FOR LIVABILITY

Sustaining the city's stature as the regional center of trade and commerce in Bicol, the Legacion administration boldly engaged with the opening of new government and business centers in the different locations in the city. The local government has already bared the initial plans for the **four (4) identified new development areas in the barangays of Balatas, Sta. Cruz, and Almeda and Mabolo-Tabuco areas.**

These new growth areas employ mixed-use urban development design that functionally integrates the combination of multiple uses such as commercial, residential, institutional, or recreational into one space. The project has been steadily taking shape with the strong support being extended by the private sector and the national government agencies through funding and land donation efforts.

The **Balatas Development Center** will be initially composed of the following: (1) a new, bigger (200-bed capacity), and modern Naga City General Hospital that is now being readied for turn-over this last quarter of the year; (2) the newly- established Balatas National High School; (3) the Center for Safety and Resiliency (CESAR) that will enhance the city's emergency and disaster response capabilities with its inter-linked and inter-agency communication facility equipped with 'intelligent' features, and is set to commence construction this November 2023; (4) PNP Headquarters that has already started construction last April, 2023; (5) BFP Headquarters; (6) the newly-opened



Multi-Purpose Event and Evacuation Center; and (7) the Naga City Urban Agriculture Training Center and Demo Farm which has already been accommodating varied livelihood trainings.

The area will feature a 20-meterwide road project with four-lane carriageway, green line with fruitbearing and flowering trees, bike lanes, and walkways, coupled with a food and leisure park, which is now undergoing construction.

The area will also be the site of seven (7) medium or highrise condominiums (*The Legacy Residences*) that will be constructed thru the *Pambansang Pabahay Para sa Pilipino* (4PH) program under the auspices of the Department of Human Settlement and Urban Development (DHSUD).

Alongside with this, the **Sta. Cruz New Development Area** now houses the (1) Naga City Health Office II; (2) Naga City Event Center I, and (3) the newly-established Sta. Cruz National High School. Other facilities that will be established thereat include a Satellite Market and a medium rise housing, among others.

At the **Almeda New Development Area** now stands the (1) new City College of Naga and (2) the RT-PCR Molecular Laboratory, which will soon be followed with the construction of TESDA office and training and innovation centers, Police Station II, and the Naga City Event Center III.



On the other hand, the **Bicol Riverfront Development Area** will feature a (1) river boulevard;
(2) People's Park and Recreation Center (PPRC) with cafes and a concert ground, and other interactive and recreational facilities; and (3) a bypass road and bridge that is now undergoing construction, which will further serve as an alternate route to ease traffic congestion particularly along the Maharlika-Diversion Road especially now that the area has been starting to welcome the rise of more business developments.

The new growth centers, together with other ongoing city infrastructure projects which include road networks and public transportation, ICT and others, are being seen to ensure mobility, accessibility, and business-friendliness. This will further build industry confidence in the city, eventually leading to investment generation, the thriving of more economic activities, and the creation of more job and employment opportunities particularly for the Nagueños.

> URBAN FORESTS FOR ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

Growing up in a farming community back in his hometown in Buhi, Camarines Sur, Legacion brought with him his love for planting and caring for the environment, in the exercise of his leadership as the mayor of Naga. Barely three (3) months into office, on September 2019, Legacion launched the **Forests-in-Our-Midst (FOM) program** by virtue of Executive Order No. 2019-046.

Unlike with other traditional tree planting programs that were being done in rural, forested areas, FOM focuses on the afforestation of the city's built-up areas—the planting of mini-forests in 'opportunity areas' within residential and commercial complexes in Naga's urban districts. With this strategy, the Legacion administration aims to have the impact of trees in mitigating the negative effects of climate change such as flooding and urban heat, to be readily felt by the communities in the commonly-affected areas, particularly those in the urban districts.

Overall, through the program, the city seeks to improve carbon sequestration and oxygen generation of trees, lower average air temperature in the vicinity of FOM sites, enhance water quality and quantity of aquifers, pump up generation of groundwater, better soil retention and absorption, prevent erosion and flooding along waterways, increase biodiversity, and help in food security.

The program highly complements the city's rapidly-growing urban landscape with the increase in volume of the infrastructure projects being constructed in land. With the urban heat island effect commonly resulting from the conversion of permeable soils into concrete pavements with the fast-paced urbanization, FOM balances the need for economic development alongside environmental sustainability.

For a fact, the launching of the first FOM site in 2019 was done at the then recently-closed 60-year-old city dumpsite. The facility was situated across the newly-established Balatas New Development Area and in near proximity to the city's Magsaysay Lifestyle District. Back then, the city's 'smokey mountain' negatively pictured the barangay and almost had the name 'Balatas' synonymous with the dirt and stench. However, at present, the 3-hectare mound, hill-like piece of property is now growing trees and ornamental gardens— providing a green, elevated landscape set at the backdrop of the growing Balatas New Development Area.

Four years forward into 2023, FOM sites in the city had grown into more than 80 and include areas categorized mainly into five (5)— (1) open spaces, (2) school sites, (3) road sides, (4) private properties, and (5) easement areas. Among these include the Re-greening Project of the city's Panganiban Drive, and the green line trailing the newly-opened Balatas-Naga City Science High School Road.

Enriched with the employment of scientific methods and techniques to ensure denser forest growth, the program has been helping increase the vegetation cover of Naga and allow for greater biodiversity to thrive in the sites.

> BOOMING INVESTMENTS AND RISING ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

With a promising environment for the thriving of business and tourism in a manner that respects the city's natural ecosystem, Naga has since been earning the trust and confidence of different foreign and local investments and developers, in coming and expanding their businesses in Naga.

Last November 2022, **Filinvest Land, Inc.** already held the groundbreaking ceremony for the land development of Futura Monte in the city— Naga's first master-planned condo community which features mid-rise condominiums with recreational amenities that will soon rise along the city's Roxas Avenue in Diversion Road.

Another township development—the largest in Bicol—the **Santerra Vista Estates** that will soon transform the city's landscape in the part of Barangay Del Rosario with its residential communities, leisure and wellness hubs, play park, business park, commercial and retail districts, was also launched in the city by Vistaland last February 2023.

In addition, only recently in July 2023, Naga welcomed the first branch of **S&R Membership Shopping** center in the Bicol Region, which is also situated along Roxas Avenue in the city's Diversion Road. Another membership shopping that expressed their interest in coming to Naga City is the **Landers Superstore** which will also be located along Roxas Avenue.

Further complementing the rise of developments taking place in that part of the city, the **Lau Tan Luas Inc.** likewise held already last April 2022, the groundbreaking ceremony for the establishment of the **Naga Global Business Park** to be located adjacent the city's newly-established Almeda New Development Area. The 9-hectare commercial complex will include a Grand Market Mall, Business Process Outsourcing Location, Townhouse Development, Health and Leisure Hub and Commercial Center.







With all the developments that have been taking place, the Legacion Administration further celebrated last September 2023, the declaration of the 25-hectare Naga City Industrial Park (NCIP) located in upland Naga as an Industrial Special Economic Zone (ecozone) by virtue of Presidential Proclamation No. 299—the first in the Bicol Region as well. Having an industrial ecozone positions Naga as a location for light manufacturing industries for export. The NCIP features 21 industrial lots for sale or lease, commercial strip that can accommodate up to 16 establishments, and other amenities. Looking into similar localities in the country with the same industrial ecozone such as Cebu, Bataan and CALABARZON, Naga is seeing the generation of more or less 10,000 direct jobs of the NCIP for the Naguenos and neighboring towns, not to mention the growth of other support industries that the NCIP will be spurring around the area, such as housing, transport, recreation and more, that will further generate more jobs.

With these investments and more, Naga City Mayor Nelson Legacion is glad to share how these developments have been and will even be generating hundreds to thousands of jobs for the Nagueños, while stimulating as well the advent of varied economic activities in the nearby areas, and therefore contributing further to the overall improvement of the city's local economy. Nevertheless, the Legacion administration commits to continue seeking the coming of more investments, for even more and better economic opportunities particularly for the Nagueños.

> UNPARALLED FEATS

The trailblazing efforts earned recognition with Naga City being hailed as the **Overall Most Competitive Component City in the entire Philippines for three consecutive years (2021, 2022, and 2023)** in Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) CMCI rankings— an interval of five (5) years from when Naga was last conferred with the coveted title and an unmatched 3-year feat. The award ranks local government units under five (5) categories namely Infrastructure, Economic Dynamism, Government Efficiency, and Resiliency, and with the recently added Innovation pillar.

Putting Naga back on track in the CMCI rankings as it was six (6) years ago, and even surpassing the then 2-year feat record, had not been an easy feat for the Legacion administration. Legacion's first term as City Mayor was plagued by series of adverse events that overwhelmed the local government and distressed the city economy— the outbreak of African Swine Fever, the occurrence of three successive strong typhoons, and the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic. It was barely six months into office when his vision for Naga was put to the test.

Yet, what has set the city apart is how his administration remained firm in delivering its expressed commitment to Nagueños even in the midst of those eventualities. The circumstances that followed did not sidetrack the city administration in pursuing a better Naga. Rather, those happenings all the more bared before the local administration the dire need and the urgency to work on needed infrastructures to avert the same happenings in the future. Thus, the City attended to the pandemic concerns at hand, while working alongside the tasks for the long-term targets.

True enough, just as when the economy started to reopen again, Naga was poised to have a responsive environment for recovery which secured the city's sustainability, post-pandemic.

The Legacion administration's next steps and aspirations remain anchored on Naga's reconfigured long-term vision of being a Happy Place, translated in Bikol as "An Maogmang Lugar", which specifically aspires for a healthy city that is peaceful, vibrant and productive, safe and smart, green and resilient—driven by excellence and solidarity, enabled by technology, powered by a strong and diversified urban and agricultural economy, and cultured by religious and cultural diversity.



A NAGA OF THE PEOPLE, BY THE PEOPLE, AND FOR THE PEOPLE

> THE GIFT OF EMPOWERMENT

A few days before Christmas, on December 20, 1995, Mayor Jesse M. Robredo and the 5th Sangguniang Panlungsod under presiding officer Vice Mayor Lourdes V. Asence, MD, gifted the people of Naga with Ordinance No. 95-092, also known as THE EMPOWERMENT ORDINANCE OF NAGA CITY. The ordinance initiated a system for a partnership in local governance between the city government and the people of Naga.

This empowerment ordinance initially contained three underlying principles of governance presupposing that:

- a. The will of the people shall always reign supreme. It shall be the prime responsibility of any government to ensure that such will is at all times manifested and enforced;
- **b.** The will of the people can best be determined if they organize themselves to address their sectoral or common concerns;
- **c.** Governance is best effected if its responsibilities are shared by the people. A system of partnership between the governor and the governed shall guarantee that sovereignty effectively resides in the people.



The ordinance allowed the government to enter into a partnership with duly accredited Naga City based people's organizations and non-government organizations in the conception, implementation, and evaluation of all government activities and functions. All accredited NGOs and POs may organize themselves into a People's Council and have their representative recognized by the Sanggunian, and through whom their rights, privileges, and responsibilities may be exercised.

> 28 YEARS LATER

On January 24, 2023, just a few days after welcoming the New Year, it was the turn of Mayor Nelson S. Legacion and the 14th Sanggunian Panlungsod under the stewardship of Vice Mayor Cecilia B. Veluz-De Asis, to gift the people of Naga with Ordinance No. 2023-004, also known as the "i-ENGAGE ORDINANCE." This ordinance, sponsored by Councilor Ghiel G. Rosales, intends to promote participation of individual citizens in Naga City's legislative process.

The i-Engage Ordinance of 2023 takes the Empowerment Ordinance of 1995 a few strides forward by allowing individual citizens, who may not be members of accredited organizations and not members of the recognized People's Council, to still participate in the legislative process of the Sangguniang Panlungsod by providing avenues for them to convey comments, objections, recommendations, or suggestions for consideration by the members of the Sanggunian on proposed measures filed in the plenary or in the committee level.

This time, the underlying principles posited that:

- **a.** Open governance ensures inclusive participation in all levels of social, political, and economic decision-making through the establishment of consultation mechanisms;
- **b.** Nation building requires open communication and free exchange of information between the government and its constituents. This fosters patriotism and nationalism which encourage them to participate in local governance;
- c. Consistent consultation with stakeholders guarantees transparency in the enactment of local legislation.

> THE GIFT OF PARTICIPATION

To ensure that feedback from citizens are received and considered, the Sanggunian Panlungsod will now adopt an enhanced legislative process where all measures filed for first reading and referred to committees shall be posted within three days after the regular session and shall not be scheduled for hearing unless posting was complied with and earnest

efforts to seek feedback from concerned sectors have been made. A valid justification shall be included in the committee report if there was non-compliance of publication and consultation; and a simple majority vote allows the Sanggunian to return the proposed matter to the committee for compliance. Approved ordinances and resolutions shall be posted for easy search and access and should be available for downloading in a Portable Document Format (PDF.) Lastly, all committee meetings and public hearings shall be live streamed in the city government or Sangguniang Panlungsod's social media

> EIGHT SCORES (OR 160 YEARS) LATER

In his Gettysburg address in 1864, Abraham Lincoln honored the soldiers that sacrificed their lives in the American Civil War with his words, "that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain - that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom - and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

160 years later, this idea of a government of the people, by the people, and for the people still resonates resoundingly. For democracies to function at its optimum level, we should respect and hear ALL people; not just those who voted for and agree with us. Additionally, in order for the people to properly and truly exercise their rights, the people should be fully and truthfully informed.

The city government of Naga knew and believed this in 1995; and do so still in 2023. People participation engenders accountability and transparency which are essential requirements in good governance; and in turn, good governance fosters economic growth, political stability, social development, and overall security.

After all, a democracy is a living system of government that prospers and progresses by being open and responsive, and by allowing itself to be reinvented and transformed.

CITY'S SECTORAL PLAN MOVES CLOSER TO FINAL APPROVAL

THE CITY'S NINE-YEAR COMPREHENSIVE DEVELOPMENT PLAN (CDP), which encompasses the years 2022 to 2030, moved close to final approval by the Sangguniang Panlungsod after positive review of the DILG-led Regional Inter-Agency CDP Review Committee last May 2.

Ruthel Gigantoca, chief of the Local Government Capability Development Division (LGCDD) of DILG Bicol, said the assessment of Naga's CDP looked at the three parameters – form, process and content – to ensure that the city's primary sectoral plan adhered to the prescribed CDP formulation guidelines and processes as developed and adopted by the department.



Form looks at the plan's compliance with prescribed forms and output documents for the different analytical processes in CDP formulation, as well as documents that led to integration of Climate Change Adaptation (CCA) and Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR).

Process looks at the extent of institutional partnerships, consultations, and linkages during plan formulation – from information sharing to consensus building – to ensure that it is consultative, participatory, and inclusive.

Content, on the other hand, looks at the plan's substance and logic - including consistency, cohesiveness, responsiveness, and comprehensiveness; and confirms use of technical and scientific data to integrate CCA and DRR.

Wilfredo Prilles Jr, head of the city's government's planning and development department, provided the highlights of the nine-year plan, which banners a new reformulation of Naga's "Maogmang Lugar" long-term vision anchored this time on being a "healthy city."







The plan will require around P30.9 billion to implement until 2030, with local funds funding 66% of the financial requirements, with the national government and international agencies expected to put up 16%; public-private partnerships (PPP) covering 15%; and borrowings around 3%.

As suggested during the planning workshops, monitoring and evaluation of the plan will be carried out by the inter-agency Naga City Statistics Committee, using the pioneering Voluntary Local Review (VLR) of the city's SDG indicators as a monitoring tool.



Initial assessment by the regional CDP review committee showed that Naga's CDP has already partially complied with the three criteria, with consolidated comments from member agencies to be consolidated by DILG Bicol for transmission to the city planning department. Right after the meeting, the CPDO already submitted the missing forms and documentation, and is only waiting for the consolidated comments.

Once fully addressed, the CDP is expected to be fully adopted by the Sangguniang Panlungsod, which conditionally approved the plan subject to review by the DILG-led committee.

DESPITE P150-M BUDGET DEFICIT NAGA TO PUSH THROUGH WITH 2023 INFRA PROJECTS

to strengthen its fund generation campaign and networking to cope with the negative impact brought about by the LGU's decreased share in the National Tax Allocation (NTA).

This was given emphasis by Mayor Nelson Legacion who revealed that his administration keeps a list of bigticket projects that are due for implementation this year. "The city government has to augment also the funds for the infrastructure projects whose constructions began last year and have to be completed within the year," he said.

The slash in the NTA share which was felt by the LGUs across the country happened due to the drop in tax collection by the national government from different industries in 2020 and 2021 during which the operations of businesses were greatly affected by the Covid-19 pandemic.

He said that the adverse effect caused by the cut in the NTA will be felt until 2024 considering that the allocations to be received by the LGUs for that year will depend on the revenues collected by the national government in 2021 or three years before the applicable year. "If the applicable year

is 2023, an LGU will receive its allocation based on the revenues collected by the national government in 2020," the mayor said.

The global economy was severely impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic in 2020 when movement restrictions and major disruptions to the global supply chain drastically reduced economic output at all levels. Naga was not spared, with many local businesses forced to close or suspend operations, leading to significantly lower taxes collected by the national government, a portion of which forms a large part of LGUs' budgets three years down the line.

Another factor that made the allocation of the cities to shrink was the conversion of two municipalities into cities, which, based on the law, must have been allocated with individual shares in the NTA, thereby making the funds distributed to all the cities throughout the country even smaller.

The mayor said the situation has made Naga City to suffer a deficit in its 2023 budget of around P150 million. Naga approved a P1.5 billion budget for 2023, which is lower than the one approved in 2022.



In the city government's Satong Aramon program hosted by Allen Reondanga, head of the City Events, Protocol, and Public Information Office (CEPPIO), Legacion bared that the city was able to acquire at least P1.5 billion as a firm funding commitment intended for the construction of roads and other lifeline projects including the Naga City Convention Center in Barangay Carolina and the Center for Safety and Resiliency (CeSaR) at the Balatas Development Center.

He said the funds and the projects on which they will be spent were included already in the 2023 General Appropriations Act.

Aside from the P1.5-B, Legacion also disclosed that the city government is confident in can acquire additional funding assistance for the projects by way of un-programmed

appropriations based on the assurances made by an official of the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH).

Un-programmed appropriations are those which provide standby authority to incur additional agency obligations for priority programs or projects when revenue collection exceed targets, and when additional grants or foreign funds are generated.

The mayor said that the construction of the convention center, which will be completed in two-or three-years' time, needs at least P600-M funding requirement while the CeSaR has to be funded with more or less P400-M to be accomplished including its technology requirements to make it resilient against potential calamities.

He announced that due to fund sourcing initiatives that his office has undertaken, the city government was able to generate an initial amount of P145 million for CeSaR. Bidding processes are now being prepared by the DPWH. For the convention center, the LGU has generated P100 million as initial fund.

Since July 2022, Legacion has begun networking with the offices of senators, congressmen, various national government agencies and government officials to be able to generate more funds for the city's projects.

"I am glad to inform my fellow Nagueños that with such initiative the city government was able to acquire firm funding commitment of P1.5 billion from different sources which is now included in the national government's 2023 general appropriations act passed by the House of Representatives and the Philippine Senate and approved by President Marcos Jr." the City Mayor said.



CITY AGRICULTURE OFFICE:

CULTIVATING TRANSFORMATIVE CHANGE FOR NAGUEÑO **FARMERS**

■ HE CITY AGRICULTURE OFFICE (CAgO) has launched an agricultural development program dedicated to uplifting the lives of local farmers. With an unwavering focus on breathing new life into the city's agricultural sector, CAgO has embarked on a series of impactful initiatives promising to reshape the landscape of farming.

At the core of CAgO's is the improvement of the income of farmers by empowering them with knowledge, resources and markets. These are pursued thru farmers field schools, farm machinery and post-harvest services, interestfree input loans, food processing and packaging services, and participation in agri-fairs.

To date, six farmers field schools (FFS) have been conducted by CAgO in partnership with national agencies and the private sector benefiting 168 farmers. Twenty-five are indigenous people (IP) from Bgy. Panicuason and an equal number are urban poor residents from Bgy. Triangulo who were trained on highvalue crop production. These were conducted in Panicuason for the IPs in partnership with the Department of Agriculture (DA), the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and the Rotary Club of Naga Caceres, and in Bay. Triangulo in partnership with SM Foundation, DA and Ruby Shelter Realty Development Corporation which lent one of its lots.

On the other hand, 37 farmers completed their three-month long training on hybrid rice production and mechanized farming in Sitio Tiripon, Bgy. Pacol while 26 participants from Bgys. Cararayan, Carolina and San Felipe completed Inbred Rice Production Technology, both in partnership with the Agricultural Training Institute, DA RFO V, and the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority. In corn, two FFS were conducted in Bgys. Carolina and Panicuason with a total of 50 graduates, likewise in partnership with DA RFO V and ATI.

The learnings gained were immediately put to use as their training coincided with the planting, growth and harvest of their own crops.





Most recently, CAgO and the UPLB-National Institute of Molecular Biology and Biotechnology collaborated in the conduct of a two-day seminar to promote the use of microbial inputs with the second day devoted to field application in two trial farms in the city. The goal is two-fold: reduce synthetic inputs to reduce cost of production, and produce healthier food for consumers. No less than 100 farmers, barangay agricultural technicians, and teachers involved in Gulayan sa Paaralan, attended the training.

To help farmers earn more from their produce, CAgO tapped the Philippine Center for Post Harvest Development and Mechanization (PhilMech) for new post-harvest facilities at the city's Nursery Site in Bgy. Carolina. A rice mill was added increasing capacity by 2.5 tons per load, while a 6-tonner dryer was recently installed and another 12-tonner dryer is on the way. A cargo truck was likewise acquired to assist farmers bring their produce to these facilities. These are on top of existing corn dryers with a combined capacity of over 20 tons per load. Henceforth, rice and corn farmers can always dry their harvest and mill them even during rainy days assuring them of a better price for their produce.

For those who are into vegetables and other high-value crops, a Food Processing Center set up under the Angat Buhay Project of then Vice President Leni Robredo and the Department of Trade and Industry is providing training and on-site services to transform excess harvest into long shelf-life more marketable food products.

Likewise, urban households are encouraged to engage in mushroom production starting with residents of Bgys Balatas. Members of Balconville, Balatas Workers Association and residents of Sitio Iwid, with support from a team of the Philippine National Police, underwent training on mushroom production. Now, they

are already producing mushroom which they either sell fresh or processed.

Periodically, local farmers are assisted in marketing their produce thru agricultural fairs either conducted by the city government or the private sector including the malls in the city. Earlier, CAgO and the Independent Component City Agriculture and Fishery Council, in partnership with the Market Enterprise Promotion Office, also ventured into wholesale and retail marketing of farm produce thru a stall at the third floor of the public market. However, it became apparent that the model won't work given the limited time farmers have to attend to their produce at the stall and their need for immediate cash. Other options are now being explored. The Jubilee Farmers Market however was a success with daily deliveries of fresh produce by 30 individual farmers and farmers groups being snapped by health-conscious consumers.

To free farmers from the clutch of compradas, the city's SARIG Loan facility lends inputs payable upon harvest without interest. Repayment rates have averages 85% notwithstanding the recurrent bad weather erratic farmgate prices. The facility lends fertilizers, pesticides and other farm inputs in kind based on the assessment of CAgO's agricultural technicians. Cushioning them from calamities is the free insurance coverage from the Philippine Crop Insurance Corporation.

Food security of consumers and income security of farmers are the primordial thrusts of the city government under Mayor Nelson S. Legacion. CAgO's initiatives and interventions, pursued in partnership with national agencies and the private sector, are all tailored towards these goals. Barring calamities, disasters and economic disruptions, the city government foresees better lives ahead for Naga City's farmers.



OCATED IN THE HEART OF BICOL REGION, Naga City has proven itself to be one of the fastest-growing economies in the Philippines. To continue this momentum towards progress and a sustainable future, Mayor Legacion advances efforts in innovation and the digital startup industry. Naga envisions itself as an innovative city with a flourishing ecosystem for startups.

The city's commitment to drive innovation can be traced back to as early as 2007, with the establishment of the Naga City Creative Media Center. The city's brainchild technology incubation facility produced several outstanding and pioneering firms, such as Nueca, a mobile app development firm that has introduced Hungrily, Community Mart and Tindahang Tapat; Extesoft-- a security software firm serving the French market; and MediaFarm, Inc.-- an animation and e-learning company doing work for Philippine and international firms.

This initiative was developed in collaboration with the Department of Trade & Industry, Department of Information & Communications Technology, Department of Science & Technology, QBO Innovation Hub, local academic institutions, and the private sectors, and the local startup community.

This industry development began by institutionalizing Naga's startup development program through Ordinances 2020-016 known as "The Naga City Digital Innovation Hub Ordinance" and 2021-057 known as "The Naga City Digital Innovation and Startup Ordinance." These ordinances aim to provide startups and enablers the needed marketing support, funding, facilities, equipment, mentorship, incubation, and network. As one of the pioneer cities that institutionalized a digital innovation and startup development program, the foundation has already been laid to allow startups and startup enablers to thrive in Naga City.

In 2019, the Naga City Digital Innovation Hub was established to provide a place not only for incubating innovation but also as a venue for creating a strong startup community—a place where innovators can explore possibilities of cooperation and synergy.

LGU NAGA continues to expand collaboration among the academic institutions to strengthen the startup ecosystem. These partnerships led to the implementation of the city's Idea2Startup program in ADNU, BISCAST, NCF, and UNC reaching more young

In 2020, *Blast Off!* the very first LGU-run digital startup pitching challenge for launch and growth-stage startups, was organized. Since then, *Blast Off!* hhas become a rolling program where startups can pitch and get funding through the Digital Innovation Fund; facilities & equipment through DIH; and partnerships, linkaging & matching opportunities with other government agencies and local businesses.

The Naga City Digital Innovation Fund (DIF) is the firstever government funding facility for tech startups managed by a local government unit. Startups, through pitching sessions, can avail of financial support in the form of grants, loans or investments.

To continually strengthen the talent pool that will pursue innovation, partnerships are being built with Naga's six academic institutions: Ateneo de Naga University (ADNU), University of Nueva Caceres, Naga College Foundation, Bicol State College of Applied Science & Technology, Camarines Sur National High School, and Naga City Science High School, through the Department

This immersive experience spanned two days at each of the four esteemed partner academic institutions in Metro Naga-Naga College Foundation, Inc., Ateneo de Naga University, Bicol State College of Applied Sciences and Technology, and University of Nueva Caceres. Jointly conducted with AQADEMY Campus Tour, powered by QBD Philippines, the bootcamp immersed students and faculty in vital startup concepts and processes.





of Education Division in Naga, to help them create their Technopreneurship Programs. In 2021, the Idea2Startup Program was launched at ADNU. This program provides funding support so that students working on their college senior or capstone projects can develop prototypes with the potential to become startup products. This program will also be implemented among the other partner academic institutions.

In 2022, Naga's innovation initiative was funded by the National Innovation Council through the 2022 National Innovation Grants, together with 12 other government institutions. The P7.5M grant helped the city in advancing the following programs to support the growth of the innovation ecosystem, as defined in the Startup Ecosystem Strategic Plan:

- Technopreneurship and Startup Mentors' Bootcamp Session (with Mentoring), participated by 11 educational institutions and 45 educators in Camarines Sur, 6 of which are undergoing consultations for the development of their schools' technopreneurship programs/ curriculum.
- School-Based Startup Bootcamp
 which generated 26 startup teams
 from 7 colleges and universities, 3 of
 which will be funded through the city's
 Idea2Startup Program.

The City Government of Naga takes a leap towards fostering startup growth with the inauguration of the Naga City loT Laboratory—a cutting-edge facility supporting loT projects and product development funded by the National Innovation Council/National Economic Development Authority. This is in partnership with Ateneo de Naga University, ThingsPH. Inc., and Packetworx Inc., which the ribbon-cutting ceremony took place yesterday, July 18, 2023. With a shared commitment to fueling loT technology, various government agencies and the local startup community united in forging a Memorandum of Agreement.

The laboratory is situated at 4/F Dolan Building, Ateneo de Naga University, oper to startups, students, and faculty from all over the region, ushering in a new era of innovation.



- Philippine Startup Week 2022 Immersion participated by 15 startups and startup enablers which brought networking opportunities for our local founders.
- Bicol Digital Congress, the first large-scale 3-day startup event in the region which included an exhibit showcasing 19 existing Bicol startups, a conference which gathered 17+ local and national speakers, networking events, and pitching presentations of 16 startup projects, participated by more than 250 attendees.
- Establishment of an IoT and 3-D Printing Laboratory which will provide a working facility in place to allow startups to explore and develop IoT (Internet of Things) and 3-D printing projects.

The city's commitment to startup ecosystem development has put Naga in StartupBlink's global list of the 2022 Top 1,000 Startup Cities, ranking 4th out of the 5 Philippine cities that made it to the list and gaining the 20th spot for Southeast Asia. Naga was also recently hailed as the Most Competitive component city in Innovation, one of the pillars in this year's Cities and Municipalities Competitiveness Index (CMCI). Among these, Naga City's startup ecosystem maturity level has emerged from *nascent* to *foundational* in 2022.

These are testaments to the administration's hardwork in promoting technology and cultivating a culture of innovation—in government, in the private sector, and among our individual citizens.

PAVING THE ROADS AHEAD: THE NAGA'S INFRASTRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENT ROADMAP

HE CITY GOVERNMENT OF NAGA done a good job in its endeavor to include in the 2023-2028 Bicol Regional Tourism Development Plan at least 18 tourism-related projects that will further boost the city's socio-economic growth. The projects are contained in the infrastructure development portfolio of Naga Mayor Nelson Legacion, which he certified as "very relevant and crucial to the tourism development of the city" as the center of trade, investment, and tourism in the Bicol Region.

On joint and collective motion, the city councilors has adopted Resolution No. 2023-265 which fully endorses Legacion's proposed infra projects to the Bicol Regional Tourism Committee (BRTC), the Department of Tourism in Bicol, and the National Economic Development Authority. The resolution is one of the requirements to consider the projects for evaluation. The first group of the projects were presented by Legacion in a meeting with the BRTC in March 2023 while the second one were presented by City Councilor Jose B. Perez during the May 17, 2023 special meeting of the BRTC.

The projects presented last May 17, 2023:

- Rehabilitation and upgrading of the Naga Airport P10.62-B
- 2. Restoration and rehabilitation of the PNR Shuttle Commuter Rail System
 - a. Sipocot-Naga-Legazpi P60-B
 - b. Rest of South Luzon Project P115B
- 3. Improvement of the 57.60 km Del Gallego to Sipocot Road along the Andaya Highway -P1.2B
- 4. Construction of Port/Pier (Pasacao, Camarines Sur to San Pascual, Masbate P300M
- Ferry Service to Mercedes and Calaguas, both of Camarines Norte, and Siruma of Camarines Sur via Bicol River and San Miguel Bay - P600M

- Construction of Caramoan-Catanduanes Connection Bridge and Highway (10km Friendship Bridge) – P30B
- Improvement/rehabilitation of JMR Coliseum P200M, and:
- 8. Construction of modern skating plaza P10M

Perez reported in his privilege speech on May 23 Sangguniang Panlungsod regular session that the abovementioned additional projects have unanimously been approved during the May 17, 2023 BRTC meeting.

As regards with the projects already presented earlier by the city mayor that are already incorporated in the Bicol Regional Tourism Development Plan for 2023-2028:

- 1. Road along Naga-Camaligan Fishing Port P38.4M
- 1. Integrated Naga River Revitalization Project P300M
- 2. Cultural and Heritage Preservation Projects P200M
- 3. Sports Tourism Projects P200M
- 4. People's Park and Recreation Center P800M
- 5. Bicol River Esplanade P464.5M
- 6. Mt. Isarog Natural Park Development P400M
- Panicuason to Malabsay Access Road Component P20M
- 8. Establishment of Bicol Regional Museum P55
- Malabsay Falls Ecotourism Park Development P26.3M

With high hopes of seeing the additional projects included in the 2023-2028 tourism development plan of the Bicol Region, Mayor Legacion along with the members of the Sangguniang Panlungsod extended his appreciation and gratitude to the BRTC, the Department of Tourism in Bicol, and the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA) for their positive response and consideration.

NAGA LAYS OUT 2023 PLAN ON NEW ROADS AND PARKS

MAGINE a multimodal tree-lined road alongside the Bicol River where one can go biking or jogging safely early in the morning or just before sunset. Think also of a large open park with families and groups of friends leisurely spending their time and children socializing in playgrounds surrounded by bike and jogging lanes not too far from a well-maintained open-air concert ground and football field.

This scene will no longer be a figment of one's imagination if the plans of the city government push through two years from now. Already, a new bypass road and access road are under construction, opening up the areas for proposed location of the Bicol River Esplanade and People's Park and Recreation Center in Barangay Tabuco. The new thoroughfares are expected to help relieve traffic congestion along Roxas Avenue, especially with the scheduled opening of two large membership shopping complexes in the area later this year. Legacion has identified the tourism projects as a top priority given that Naga lacks adequate open spaces for recreation and leisure.

The city mayor said the project will be undertaken in 2024 and it is hoped that the city government can secure financial support from senators, congressmen, and government agencies. Legacion added that he has been meeting personally with potential sponsors of priority infrastructure projects to save the city government from spending its meager resources. A bridge connecting the Sagop Creek and the Bicol River Esplanade/Boulevard (Barangay Tabuco side) will also be constructed this year.

The city mayor also said that the Naga City Police Office Station 5, which is based at the Bicol Central Station, will set up a permanent headquarters in a 1,000 sq. meter lot inside the proposed People's Park and Recreation Center to look after the area's peace and order.

In another part of Naga, plans are underway to improve the access road from Magsaysay Avenue leading to the Balatas New Development Area. Last year, the city government finished constructing a crucial road link from the Naga City Science High School to the Balatas-Cararayan road, relieving traffic congestion at the Magsaysay-Dayangdang-Balatas junction. Mayor Legacion said that this road will be further developed into a four-lane road with P49.5 million provided by the office of Senator Ramon Revilla Jr.

To be funded with P20-M sourced as grant by Mayor Nelson Legacion from the office of Sen. Sonny Angara is the road widening project that will start from the corner of Magsaysay Avenue to the Naga City Science High School in Barangay Balatas where the aforementioned road begins.

The city government has already constructed the Balatas National High School to ease the strain on the Camarines Sur National High School, the Naga City Event Center II, the New Naga City Hospital, of which the construction is ongoing, the Urban Agriculture Training and Demo Farm Center, and an expanse of land where the Center for Safety and Resiliency will be put up. Soon to rise at the new development area is a large satellite market and bagsakan center for agricultural products to be put up by businessman Robert Objedo, who is the proprietor of the Villa Caceres Hotel.

Soon to start also this year is the re-blocking and widening project along the Balatas-Cararayan-San Isidro-Carolina road with P300-M budget. The project will link with the already-widened portion of the road from Cararayan to San Isidro.

In an interview, the city mayor also disclosed that as part of the Department of Public Works and highways' regular programing, the government agency has appropriated around P55-M for the implementation of its continued road widening project along the San Felipe-Pacol-Carolina road.

Regarding the construction of the 2.1-kilometer Almeda-Mabolo Bypass Road, the mayor said that the project has already an available complete budget of P400 million (P200-M for the construction of the bridge, and another P200-M for the road construction in Mabolo section) that is expected to be completed in year 2024.



HE focus of assessment were viewed in light of the six award criteria, namely: Responsiveness of Legislative Agenda; Availability of Legislative Documents; Effectiveness of Performance of Sanggunian; Efficiency of Performance of Sanggunian; Legislative Citations and Awards; and Capacity of and Development for Legislators and Staff. Department of Interior and Local Government, in celebration of Local Government Month, handed out awards and commendations at the Regional Recognition Ceremony 2023 in Legazpi City, Albay on October 23, 2023. Vice Mayor Cecilia B. Veluz-De Asis, together with City Councilors Jessie Albeus, Joselito Del Rosario, Jose Perez, Salvador Del Castillo, and Sanggunian Secretary Gil De La Torre, received the Local Legislative Award 2023 which was bestowed on Naga City as the Outstanding Sanggunian in the Independent Component City Category.

The Assessment Methodology invoThe Assessment Methodology involved a three-pronged process to ensure a detailed evaluation of the performance of the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Naga City. Firstly, the employment of Live Virtual (Hybrid) and Cloudbased evaluation wherein the Means of Verifications (MOV) submitted by the Sanggunian through Google Drive were carefully reviewed by the Regional Award Committee (RAC) members. An online interview with the representatives of the Sanggunian was subsequently conducted to validate key findings and clarify questions from the RAC.

Secondly, the RAC members individually rated the Sanggunian and descriptive statistics of averaging was applied. Lastly, the RAC considered the findings and noteworthy accomplishments of the Sanggunian based on the six award criteria. At this stage, the RAC made the final determination that the 13th Sangguniang Panlungsod of Naga City has more than satisfactorily

surpassed the criteria and qualified for endorsement to the National Awards Committee (NAC.)

The ordinances and resolutions that were reviewed by the Regional Awards Committee were enacted within the years 2019 - 2022, which fell under the term of the 13th Sanggunian Panlungsod, Newly-elected Vice Mayor Cecilia B. Veluz-De Asis served as the Presiding Officer of the 13th Sangguniang Panlungsod. Although this was her first term as Vice Mayor, she brought to the 13th SP a wealth of wisdom and experience cultivated in her more than three decades tour as a veteran public servant and legislator; 18 years of which as councilor in the 6th, 7th, 8th, 10th, 11th, and 12th Sanggunian.

As always, the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Naga pledges dedication towards supporting the development agenda of Mayor Nelson Legacion's administration, and commitment to push important legislations that will ensure fulfillment of the promises made to the people of Naga and the realization of a common vision for a Naga under a city government that is reliable, dependable, and caring.

NAGA WINS LEGAL BATTLE VS MARIANOS **NAGA CITY --- IT'S FINALLY OVER**

HE SUPREME COURT, SITTING EN **BANC**, has in the end decided to grant the city government of Naga and other government instrumentalities the right to possess the property, as well as the so-called Naga City Civic Center with its appurtenant structures, such as the Museo ni Jesse Robredo, as its own.

This, after almost 20 years of bitter legal tussle between the heirs of Jose and Helen Mariano and the City of Naga over possession of the contested 5-hectare land was finally resolved in favor of the city. The order also called for the City of Naga to pay the Marianos just compensation and the amount representing exemplary damages.

The amount of just compensation with legal interest of 6% per annum of the value of property at the time of the taking which is estimated to cost about P15M to P20M plus exemplary damages pegged at P1M.

The decision, voted 15-0 by the Supreme Court Justices was promulgated on October 18, 2022 but was released by the Supreme Court on June 8, 2023, just in time when Naga was celebrating its 75th or Diamond anniversary as a chartered city that culminated on June 18.

The case started sometime in 2004 during the incumbency of then Mayor Jesse Robredo when the Marianos filed a complaint of unlawful detainer alleging that there was no signed deed of donation to show between landowners Macario Mariano and Jose A. Gimenez and

then Naga Mayor Monico Imperial sometime on August 21, 1954.

The case was first decided in favor of the city as possessor of the land by the Municipal Trial Court, Naga City but which was reversed and set aside by the Regional Trial Court that virtually prompted the Marianos to demand the city government to vacate the premises.

On March 12, 2018, the First Division of the Supreme Court overturned the amended decision rendered by the Court of Appeals and reinstated, albeit with modifications, the RTC's decision.

It was as if the city government had lost the

case, ordered to pay large sum of money up to over P1B representing the use of the property since 1954 and its eventual eviction from the two properties where the city hall and the Naga City civic center are situated, that altogether occupy five

Unfazed, the city government brought the matter to the Supreme Court and found the First Division to have erred in ordering city hall and all the government offices situated in the contested property to "peacefully surrender and deliver the physical possession of the subject realty to petitioners (Marianos)."

The Supreme Court en banc stated that considering that the physical return of the subject property on which city hall and other government offices are erected is no longer feasible, and that the property was taken by the government for public use, the aggrieved owner (Marianos) may demand for payment of just compensation for the land taken.

With this, the controlling doctrine is that when there is actual taking by the government without expropriation proceedings, the owner of the property is entitled to just compensation which is pegged at the value of the property at the

time of taking, the Supreme Court Resolution noted.

The Supreme Court resolution provided for the formula in computing the amount of just compensation reckoning August 16, 1954 as the time of taking.



The decision, voted 15-0 by the Supreme Court Justices was promulgated on October 18, 2022 but was released by the Supreme Court on June 8, 2023, just in time when Naga was celebrating its 75th or Diamond anniversary as a chartered city that culminated on June 18. The current mayor himself, Atty. Nelson Legacion, was the city legal officer during the infant stages of the case.

Hereunder quoted is the dispositive portion of the Supreme Court resolution:

"THE FOREGOING DISQUISITIONS CONSIDERED, respondent City of Naga's Second Motion for Reconsideration is hereby PARTLY GRANTED. Accordingly, the Decision dated March 12, 2018 and the Resolution dated July 23, 2018 rendered by the First Division of this Court are AFFIRMED with MODIFICATIONS in that:

- 1. The order for respondent and all government instrumentalities, agencies, and offices claiming right of possession through and under it to peacefully surrender and deliver to petitioners the physical possession of the land covered by Transfer of Certificate Title No. 671, including all improvements and structures erected thereon, is hereby DELETED;
- 2. The award of monthly rental in favor of petitioners is likewise DELETED;
- 3. Respondent City of Naga is ORDERED to pay petitioners just compensation in accordance with this ruling, with legal interest of six percent (6%) per annum on the value of the property at the time of taking, i.e., August 16, 1954, until full payment is made; and 4) Respondent City of Naga is ORDERED to pay petitioners exemplary damages in the amount of PI,000,000.00.

"The case is REMANDED to Branch 26, Regional Trial Court of Naga City for the determination of just compensation. The said court is DIRECTED to resolve the instant case with dispatch."

In a press conference with local media reporters at city hall last Saturday, an elated Mayor Nelson Legacion thanked Atty. Jose Anselmo Cadiz for triumphantly handling the case pro bono from start to finish.

Cadiz himself revealed that it was his high school classmate, then Mayor Robredo who asked him to handle the case for the city. Atty. Cadiz was a private practitioner with law office in Manila. He was national president of the Integrated Bar of the Philippines before his appointment as Solicitor General by the Aguino administration. He ran for Camarines Sur governor and then as congressman in the 3rd district but lost in both instances.

Legacion also thanked former Naga City legal officer Angel Oiastro and incumbent city legal officer Mcgyver Gerard Orbina for ably handling the case in collaboration with Atty. Cadiz. The current mayor himself, Atty, Nelson Legacion, was the city legal officer during the infant stages of the case.

The former editor-in-chief of this paper, now Councilor Joe Perez was in 2006 cited for contempt and thereupon incarcerated for five days at the Naga City District Jail because of a controversial article written about the raging episodes of the legal battle between the Marianos and City Hall.
